English

Our focus as an English department at Maplewell is to develop literacy skills across the three strands: oracy, reading and writing. We offer students a broad and balanced, knowledge-rich curriculum with the opportunity to work towards a recognised English qualification at the end of their time with us.

Extra Support

The English Department believes that all students should be treated as individuals and therefore, personalised systems of support are in place for students who need additional help with their reading, writing and comprehension.

As well as the whole-class reading support through the Reading Curriculum, we also timetable one to one intervention sessions for any KS 3, 4 and 5 students identified as needing a further boost. This can take the form of additional phonics teaching specifically designed for older readers, or DI/PT (direct instruction precision teaching), a method of learning vocabulary where phonics has not been successful.

English Curriculum at a Glance: 2024-25







The Maplewell Curriculum follows three distinct pathways designed to meet the needs of all our pupils:

Pathway A: Stretch and Challenge Pathway B: Step up to Independence

Pathway C: Learning for Life

Year 7 All groups will be phonics tested and sit the NGRT reading test in the first half term whilst following a Transition Unit. Groups will then be split into A (Stretch and Challenge) and B (Step Up to Independence), with both groups following a knowledge-based curriculum, starting their 'journey through English language and literature'. The Year 7 C Pathway will follow an adapted version of this curriculum, alongside a phonics programme which has been carefully designed for older learners.

Year 8 The A group will be comprised of students aiming to be GCSE ready by the end of Y9, and the B group will follow a programme which develops literacy and reading skills suited to Entry Level. Phonics teaching may be embedded within the B group programme, dependent on the cohort.

Year 9 Year 9 again will consist of an A and B group; the A group will continue their journey throughout language and literature whilst developing the skills and knowledge required to access the GCSE curriculum, and the B group will develop the Entry 1 and 2 skills and knowledge required to achieve an AQA Entry 3 level qualification in Y11, with the potential to also sit the English Language GCSE.

Year 10 and 11 The A group will follow the GCSE programme (Lang and Lit). The B group will follow an AQA Entry Level programme with the ultimate goal for most being an Entry 3 qualification at the end of Y11. Depending on the cohort, students in the B group may be entered for the GCSE language paper.

Post 16 Students who remain with us in Post 16 will work towards either GCSE English Language or the ASDAN English Short Course to support the vocational curriculum over 1, 2 or 3 years dependent on their P16 pathway.

Learning for Life Pathway (Pathway C) A personalised curriculum, adhering to a 'stages not ages' approach has been designed to bridge the gaps which some students may have from early years' education and equip them with basic literacy skills, particularly reading and communication. The flexible approach takes into account the additional complex needs of students in this group.
