
English at Maplewell Post-16

Our focus as an English department at Maplewell Post-16 is to develop literacy skills across the three strands: oracy, reading and writing. We offer students the opportunity to work towards a recognised English qualification at the end of their time with us. The Main Pathway prepares students to take (or where relevant retake), GCSE English Language, whereas the Life Ready Pathway focuses on developing English skills, through the ASDAN English short course challenges. In addition to this, students will encounter a range of fiction and non-fiction texts, to develop their reading skills and cultural capital.

Overview



Main Pathway

The Main pathway explores English Language over one year, with an explicit focus on the skills students will need to be successful at GCSE English and beyond. In addition to this, we look to build cultural capital through exploring a range of fiction and non-fiction texts. English Language (GCSE)

Course Overview:

The AQA Language specification is designed to inspire and motivate students, providing appropriate stretch and challenge whilst ensuring that the assessment and texts are, as far as possible, accessible to all students.

It enables students to develop the skills they need to read, understand and analyse a wide range of different texts and write clearly in a range of styles. Prospective GCSE students will begin working on these analytical skills during Key Stage 3.

How the qualification is assessed:

The Language GCSE is assessed through two exams:

- Language Paper 1 (50% of GCSE) consists of an unseen extract from a fictional text with accompanying questions, plus a creative writing question.
- Language Paper 2 (50% of GCSE) consists of two unseen extracts from non-fiction texts, plus a non-fiction writing question.

Where does it lead?

GCSE English Language is one of the most important qualifications a person can have; it helps to unlock many doors to further education and employment.



Life Ready

The **Life Ready** pathway again looks to equip students with literacy skills that they will need during their time at Maplewell, and beyond. We take a functional approach to English using the ASDAN English Short Course, ensuring that students develop their existing reading, writing and spoken language skills.

This pathway looks to develop students' reading skills as a priority, provision will include, where needed, phonics and DI/PT to support developing readers.

Course Overview:

The ASDAN English Short Course accredits up to 60 hours of English language and literature activities. The challenges can be seen as opportunities to develop skills in English as well as assessment opportunities.

The English Short Course contains six modules:

- 1. Developing communication skills
- 2. Speaking and listening
- 3. Reading and writing styles
- 4. Reading for pleasure
- 5. Writing for a purpose
- 6. Reading for a purpose

Teachers will carefully select a range of activities from these modules in order to support the development of reading, writing and spoken language skills whilst at the same time encouraging teamwork and the development of life skills.

How the qualification is assessed:

Learners must present evidence of their activities in an organised portfolio or e-portfolio.

This will contain:

- a record of challenges completed, with supporting evidence for each challenge
- recording documents, showing how learners have planned and reviewed their activities
- summary of achievement, highlighting skills development
- personal statement

Where does it lead?

The ASDAN English Short Course is designed to develop skills for further education or work.
